### 2009 GRANT RECIPIENTS

The Loudoun Preservation Society's signature program provides annual grants to local non-profit organizations and governments for the restoration or preservation of historic buildings and landscapes; the conservation of material culture; and the documentation and publication of Loudoun's history. LPS has distributed over \$818,000 to more than 50 organizations.

The 2009 grants were awarded at our annual meeting at Oatlands in December. Eight organizations received a total of \$27,478.60. Recipients were:

Banshee Reeks Chapter of the Archeological Society of Virginia – \$3,697 to be used for the purchase of archaeological equipment to support their field work, laboratory analysis, and documentation. The Chapter is a first time recipient of a Preservation Society grant.

The Northern Virginia Regional Parks Authority – \$5,000 will go toward a wheel replacement project at Aldie Mill.

Christian Community Church at St. Paul's (Neersville) – \$5,000 grant award to partially fund a

new slate roof for the historic structure. The organization received the Catherine Boyd Grant, named in honor of a founder of the Loudoun Restoration and Preservation Society.

The Waterford Foundation – \$3,500 to partially fund the repair and painting of the exterior walls of the John Wesley Community Church.

George C. Marshall International Center at Dodona Manor – \$2,500 for the removal of dead trees on the property.

Mosby Heritage Area Association – \$1,531.60 to fund publication of the scavenger hunt booklet.

Westmoreland Davis Memorial Foundation – \$2,250 for the conservation of a portrait of Governor Davis's mother.

Oatlands – \$4,000 for plaster work on the tea house column capitals and masonry repairs to the brick floor.



## PRESERVATION RESOURCES COMMITTEE

The focus of the Preservation Resources Committee is on non-legislative projects for promoting preservation in the county. This broad mission includes assisting individuals or groups with their preservation efforts; raising awareness about both success stories and sites that are endangered, and educating the public about the importance of preservation and conservation. The committee was formed under the former Preservation Society of Loudoun County (PSLC), and its accomplishments included the formation of the Friends of the Blue Ridge Mountains organization and the publication of the Citizens Guide to Historical, Cultural and Environmental Organizations in Loudoun County.

The committee is actively working on several current and future projects. One is an online resource guide for owners or prospective owners of historic properties and for those trying to save an endangered historic site. It will offer information on rehabilitation tax credits, land conservation easements, research tools, and like-minded organizations. The committee hopes to launch the online guide by May.

LPS has partnered with the Joint Architectural

Review Board to present awards during National Preservation Month in May. We will make our Preservationist of the Year Award, and the JARB will recognize outstanding preservation projects in the county and town historic districts. The awards will be announced at an event hosted by LPS. Details have yet to be worked out but this will be an event for our members, award recipients, government officials and representatives from other preservation organizations in the county. We envision this activity growing into something bigger for Preservation Month in future years.

Lastly, the Committee is discussing a possible project related to maintenance of family cemeteries. It was brought to our attention that many are suffering from neglect. We are researching the existing state legislation, legal ramifications, and what other localities are doing.

## LOUDOUN COUNTY PRESERVATION AND CONSERVATION COALITION

Two years into its existence, the Coalition continues to advocate at the local and state level on applications and legislation impacting preservation and conservation. The group is an informal alliance of over 20 historic preservation and environmental non-profit organizations in the county. Its members and their organizations worked on several issues recently, such as supporting the Limestone Overlay District (recently approved by the Board of Supervisors), researching the formation of a Heritage Commission (which most neighboring counties already have), and participating in the discussion about implementing portions of the Chesapeake Bay Regulations.

The Coalition's "In Our Backyard" column continues to run every other week in Leesburg Today. Written by member organizations, the articles strive to educate the general public about Loudoun's history

and environment. Thirty-two columns have been published, covering topics such as the preservation of Carlheim/Paxton in Leesburg and how to help wildlife in your backyard. This year's column will resume in March.

This past January, the Coalition hosted an event, "In Our Backyard—A Celebration of Loudoun's Historical and Environmental Heritage". Held at Loudoun Water's spacious facility in Ashburn, 18 of the Coalition's member organizations had exhibits and answered questions about their activities. Despite snow the previous day, public attendance was strong. Loudoun's new County Administrator, Tim Hemstreet, attended and made a few remarks. Keynote speaker, Rick Gillespie, gave a motivating talk about cherishing and preserving Loudoun's history and environment.

#### **The Arc of Loudoun Signs Lease at Paxton**

After sitting vacant for five years, the Carlheim mansion in Leesburg, better known as Paxton, and its 16 acres were leased to the Arc of Loudoun, a nonprofit agency serving citizens with diverse special needs. Now known as the Margaret Paxton Memorial Learning and Resource Campus, the estate will serve as a learning center, most notably for the Aurora School. Much needs to be done to the mansion to meet modern needs. LPS is assisting The Arc of Loudoun with grant applications to raise funds for rehabilitation of the building.
